Many cats live outside. Some will run to you and say hello. They may **bunt** your ankles — rubbing their heads on you. Others will run and hide. But they still need people.

What can you do? Do not follow a cat who is hiding. Have an adult call your local animal shelter or animal control office. These groups may catch the cat with a cage that closes when she steps inside for food. They may give her vaccines or shots to keep her healthy. They may give an operation to keep her from having babies. The cat may be returned outside, where kind people may feed her.

His favorite part about giving: "It made me feel really good that my drawings brought people together. And I enjoy sketching — anything from country flags to me playing sports."


His tip: "Follow what you love. There are so many ways to do good."

IF YOU HAVE A NEW NEIGHBOR!


Have you noticed new, big birds on a farm or park near you? Have you heard honking in the skies? Many Canada geese have flown south from their homes in Canada and Alaska. They have **migrated**, or traveled to a new place. In the south, it is warmer. That means more food and water that is not frozen.

How do Canada geese know the way? They watch rivers, mountains, and shores. They watch the sun and stars. In the spring, many Canada geese will fly back north. Some will stay for the food and safety of their new homes.
